Mitchell Lake Association: Dedicated to improving the quality of our lake

The purpose of the Association is:

- To maintain, protect, and improve the water quality, aesthetic values, wildlife habitat, and recreational capacity of Mitchell Lake;
- To educate shoreline owners and the public about the condition and protection of Mitchell Lake; and
- To provide a framework for representation for work with federal, state, and local agencies for improving the quality of Mitchell Lake.

Great News: Mitchell Lake removed from Impaired Waters List

Thanks to the efforts and partnerships between the Mitchell Lake Association, the RPBC watershed, and the City of EP, Mitchell Lake water quality levels have improved over the past several years.


Mitchell Lake has been on the MPCA impaired waters list since 2002. In 2018, Mitchell Lake was removed from the impaired waters list and is now classified as a Healthy/Shallow Lake.

Removal from impaired waters list is a great start, but we need to stay diligent in continuing to drive water quality efforts going forward.

Note: Every two years, MPCA creates a list of impaired waters that do not meet water quality standards. Monitoring suggests that about 40% of Minnesota's lakes and streams are impaired for conventional pollutants.

The graphs show the trends over time. The red line on each graph marks the MPCA standard. The goal is for the average values (the dots) to be below the red line

Mitchell Lake receives Clean Water Grant

With help from Hennepin County, Mitchell Lake has been selected as a recipient of a Clean Water Fund grants from the Minnesota Board of Water and Soil Resources.

The grant funds efforts by the Riley-Purgatory-Bluff-Creek Watershed District and the city of Eden Prairie to evaluate phosphorus loading in stormwater ponds that feed into the lakes which will help pinpoint potential phosphorus reduction areas. The grant earmarks \$70,000 for the project.

Phosphorus is a naturally occurring element in lake environments, but high levels of it — from leaves, dirt, and other debris entering storm drains for example— can overload a lake's ecosystem and cause algae blooms that reduce the lake's oxygen content, killing the other plants and animals.



We are listening! We completed our annual membership survey in the fall of 2018 to help set plans and priorities for 2019. We received 39 responses. Thank you for your feedback.



Adopt a Dock

What is it? A watershed sponsored program for lake residents to install mussel detection plates on their dock and monitor monthly.

<u>Why?</u> Regular examination can result in earlier detection and opportunity for treatment before they become too wide spread.

Weeds!!!

Weed harvesting and treatment was the #1 priority issue for 39 respondents to our fall 2018-member survey.

Weed Harvesting – In 2018 the City of EP spent \$14K on Mitchell Lake weed harvesting, covering 15 acres in the spring and 10 acres in the summer. The City of EP will once again be harvesting weeds on Mitchell Lake in 2019.

Homeowner Weed Harvesting Rebate – MLA is now offering a \$100 weed harvesting rebate to Mitchell Lake Association members that have paid their 2019 dues. Members can have their private lakeshore harvested at the same time as the City contracted vendor harvests the general lake in 2019. Watch for future notice for the City approved vendor and the date(s) the lake is to be harvested. North Bay Weeds - Are you frustrated with not being able to navigate through the weeds in the North Bay? This spring, the MLA board with be holding a meeting with concerned members to develop a plan to address weeds. Zebra Mussels

Zebra mussels, an aquatic invasive species (AIS), were discovered in Lake Riley last October. This is the first lake in the Riley Purgatory Bluff Creek Watershed District found to have zebra mussels.

These fast spreading mussels attach to docks, boats, rocks, logs, and other surfaces in the lake and can create threats to recreation and to the stability of a lake ecosystem. No zebra mussels have been found yet and we hope to keep it that way. In 2018, three Mitchell Lake residents participated in the Adopt a Dock monitoring program.

To prevent their spread - Clean all aquatic plants, animals and mud from watercraft, trailers, docks, lifts, anchors and other recreational equipment *before leaving any lake access*.

If suspected Zebra Mussels are detected – Contact the Riley Purgatory Bluff Creek watershed district or the DNR immediately.



NEW for 2019: Mitchell Lake Fish Stocking

The MLA board is happy to announce that we will be launching a fish stocking effort this year to improve the recreational value of our lake. We are also providing an opportunity for interested members to make contributions (over and above the \$35 annual dues) that will be used specifically for fish stocking.

Background - Mitchell Lake was once a great fishing lake, but the large fish population and diversity was significantly reduced after the winterkills in 2007-8 and 2010 – 11 caused

by low lake oxygen levels (future winterkills should be minimized because the City of EP now routinely monitors Mitchell lake oxygen levels and installs an aerator when needed). After the past winterkills, the DNR began stocking Mitchell Lake with walleye, bluegill and largemouth bass. The DNR has since discontinued stocking Mitchell Lake and does not plan to start up again unless another significant winterkill occurs. The lake now does have an abundant population of northern pike, but the walleye, largemouth bass and crappies populations remain low.

2019 Plan - In effort to enhance and diversify Mitchell Lake's fish population, the MLA board has appropriated \$1000 for fish stocking in 2019. The plan is to stock adult largemouth bass and crappies from Rademacher Fish Farms in Owatonna. By stocking adult fish vs. fingerlings, the survival rate should be greatly enhanced. Stocking to occur in the spring just after ice-out to give fish a chance to spawn this year (approx. 2,000 fertilized eggs per nest is normal for adult bass). Our initial \$1,000 will be used as follows:

Species	Size	Number	Unit Cost	Total Cost

Goose Management

Are the geese making a mess on your lawn or beach? MLA will again be working with the City of EP this summer to remove the bothersome geese. There is a limited window of time when geese can be relocated or removed safely. We will reach out to the membership thru email and share the necessary forms. When spring comes, there are some things you can do to help manage geese:

- 1. Convert shoreline areas to tall, native grasses or plants (min width 20 feet)
- 2. Don't feed the geese
- 3. Erect scare tape or goose fences at the edges of shorelines
- 4. Minimize the use of Kentucky Bluegrass if you are planting grass
- 5. Plant groupings of trees or shrubs in grazing areas

\$250 Landscape for Water Quality Rebate

MLA will continue to offer a \$250 supplemental rebate to paid members who complete a Riley Purgatory Bluff Creek Watershed District (RPBCWD) or City of EP approved shoreline restoration or rain garden rebate project in 2019.

How do Shoreline buffers and Rain gardens improve Water Quality?

- Capture Pollutants Planting rainwater gardens and creating shoreline buffers help slow water runoff, capture pollutants that are in the rainwater and let the water infiltrate slowly into the ground
- **Mitigate Erosion** Native vegetation slows down water runoff and their longer root systems help reduce erosion and absorb extra nutrients.
- **Provide Better Wildlife Habitat -** Native plants provide food or shelter for many song birds, butterflies and other wildlife and deter geese.
